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CSF Spotlight: Ruth Holland

week after Ruth Holland was evicted from her apartment in Queens in April 1999, she returned to pick up mail that had accumulated and found a letter from the Children's Scholarship Fund saying her son, Moses, had won a scholarship. Although it was a horrible time for Ruth and Moses, the scholar-

home. Now in their Bronx apartment more than four years, Moses is beginning 7th grade at Grace Lutheran School in the Bronx this September, while Ruth is studying for her masters degree. Every day is still a struggle, but they are deeply grateful for the scholarship.

In spite of their circumstances, Ruth managed to get Moses enrolled in a private school in her old neighborhood in Queens so that Moses would have the continuity of his friends and neighborhood during this difficult time. Living in homeless shelters in Manhattan while she tried to get back on her feet, Ruth would wake Moses up at 5:30 every morning and ride with him on the bus to school. Ruth would often wait for Moses and ride the bus back with him in the afternoon, spending her days at the neighborhood church near her old apart-After a year in shelters, the family qualified for an apartment in the East Tremont section of the Bronx. Ruth remembers the day they first saw the apartment as a very

ocated in Long Island City, Queens, Evangel Christian School is a private nondenominational Christian school that was founded in 1985. The goal of the school, which serves almost 500 students in pre-K through 12th grade, is to "provide an environment where students can be educated in the highest principles of character, Christian leadership, selfdiscipline, individual responsibility, personal integrity and good citizen-

Most of the school is housed in a former public school, but a large modern wing has been added to create a gym, cafeteria, meeting space, and outdoor play areas. The school also has good science and computer labs. Boy's and girl's volleyball, basketball, and track teams compete with other Christian schools in the tri-state area. Students have weekly classes in art, music, library, phys. ed., and all classes attend weekly chapel service on Fridays. Students are encouraged to do ministry and community service, and some of the high school students have traveled to West Virginia to work on constructing houses for the homeless.

Principal Marilyn Johannsen says the school is very ethnically diverse, reflecting its immigrant neighborhood.





ore than 2,000 children will enter the private school of their family's choice for the first time this fall with new Children's Scholarship Fund scholarships. Eleven of our local partners are adding new scholarship winners with a combination of locally raised funds and matching funds from CSF.
