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24,000 Children Using CSF **Awards for 2006-07 School Year**

e are gearing up for an exciting 2006-07 school year at the Children's Scholarship Fund. Thanks to our generous donors and all our partner programs across the country, CSF will once again be helping more than 24,000 children attend the school of their choice.

It is a particularly exciting time for us in New York City. This year, thanks to our partnership with the Endowment for Inner-City Education, the Inner-City Scholarship Fund, the Patrons Program, Futures in Education, and many other generous donors, we have awarded more than 2,000 new scholarships for children to enter private school for the first time. As we enter our 8th year of providing tuition assistance, our program in New York City is the largest it has ever been.



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Private Schools Performing Well

ou may have read about a study released by the Department of Education this summer that found little difference in standardized test scores between public school and private school students. The results are not consistent with the CSF experience, but have also been called into question by other researchers.

Paul Peterson and Elena Llaudet of Harvard's Kennedy School of Government analyzed the data used in the study but made adjustments for student background characteristics (something the original study did not do). The Harvard researchers then found that private school students scored higher than public school students in 11 out of 12 comparisons, and the difference between private and public scores was statistically significant. The researchers also pointed out that the study measured students at only one point in time, limiting its usefulness.

Time and time again, studies have shown that private school students have a significant advantage over public school students in test scores, college attendance, and graduation rates. Here are some interesting facts about private schools from the Council for American Private Education:

- Private school students are twice as likely to graduate from college.
- Private school students from families in the lowest quartile of socio-economic status are almost four times as likely to graduate from college as their public school counterparts.
- In 2003, the Dept. of Education released National Assessment of Education Progress results showing that 53% of private school 8th graders read at or above the "proficient" level, compared with only 30% of public school students.
- The same year, 43% of private school 8th graders scored at the "proficient" level in math, while only 27% of the public school children did so.
